Dear Friends

The word 'radical' excites and frightens with equal force. For those struggling with injustice, prejudice and the bogged-down nature of institutions and personalities, 'radical' gives the impetus to change and reform, to transform and hope. For others the same word threatens upset, revolution and chaos to stability and the settled order of things. The word radical is from the Latin *radix,* which means root. To be radical means to get to the root of things.

At this year's General Assembly, which starts on 19th May, we will be looking at a radical action plan. A lacklustre plan was rejected last year, and this year something more thought-through, and more radical is proposed. In what is widely anticipated to be a rootand-branch review of the Church nationally, regionally

and locally, what the Assembly will be asked to consider is something that will look at who the Church is, what the Church does, and how we reform ourselves within the C21st. There is always a danger of over-promising and under-delivering, and it remains to be seen what the Assembly, and then the wider Church, decides and commits itself to in the years to come. The impact of being radical is rarely immediate, and often takes years to work through. It's a reminder of another Latin motto, *Ecclesia reformata semper reformanda,* the reformed Church must always be reforming. And that's radical!

Within the word 'revolution' is the word 'evolution' and I believe this also applies to the Church. Whether there is a sudden, radical change, or whether there is a steady process of transformation, the life of the Christian, and the Christian Church, is always one containing dynamic, and



Change can be unsettling, particularly given our country's unsettled state at this moment. We want things to be steady and balanced, and the tension between stability and progress is pretty constant. It is true in life, and it is true in faith. On the Road to Emmaus, having spoken to the disciples, the

risen Jesus "appeared to be going further, but they constrained Him." I wonder, if in that 'further', we find a clue to what God invites and challenges us to do. Shall we go further with God, or will we, futilely, attempt to restrain?

The Kirk Session met in April. Amongst its business:

- Stewardship and Finance Committee: The 2018 accounts were approved.
- Session divided into small groups to discuss a paper which had been circulated by the Minister inviting elders to create a realistic wish list of events or ideas that might challenge Session and the congregation to take on in the next couple of years. Brief verbal feed- back was given by each group and further thought will be given to the ideas raised.
- The Property Committee reported on its ongoing, and considerable, work in maintaining the fabric of the Church. Matters considered included restoring masonry work around the building; dealing with water ingress in the South Aisle of the Church; replacing existing floodlighting with more efficient and economic lamps (largely to be funded by a generous donation from the Friends of Morningside); and replacing the control panel of the gas boiler that heats the St Matthew Hall.
- The Pastoral Care Committee reported on the work of the church visitors, and on recent events like the well-supported Blue Christmas service and the training events organised by our pastoral assistant, Jacqui Lindsay. The Wednesday Coffee morning continues to flourish with more attending, including a group from the Royal Edinburgh Hospital. More volunteers to help with coffee making would be extremely helpful in the coming months and the congregation will be invited to volunteer.
- Church Officer: with the retirement of Tommy Batchelor, Session considered the possibility of a volunteer group to carry out duties but this was felt to be unsustainable over the long term. A new appointment will be considered in the coming months.
- Communications Committee: it was noted that there were ongoing issues with the Church website, and plans were being explored to update the website in the coming weeks.

GUIDED WALK DOWN ROYAL MILE

One of our Church badminton club members, Mrs Frances Morton, has kindly offered to take a group of around 10 Church members on a guided tour down part of the Royal Mile. Fran is a professional tour guide and has led numerous tours in Edinburgh and around Scotland. She has suggested a 2 hour walk, starting at the Castle Esplanade and finishing at John Knox's House, which will include visiting some of the many closes, St Giles' Cathedral and possibly also Parliament Hall. The proposed date is 21st May, commencing at 10am, and those who would like to come along and hear something of the history and stories surrounding this part of Edinburgh's Old Town should contact me on 531 9688. There will be no charge for this walk and the only stipulation is that you remember to wear sensible shoes and to wear clothing appropriate for this time of year!!

WORSHIP MATTERS

Afternoon service, 7th May, 3.15pm

Summer Worship

The Kirk Session has approved the replacement of the antiquated and inconsistent and expensive heating system in the Church, the replacement of pews with more comfortable, user-friendly and flexible seating, and the levelling of the floor in the Church, which will prevent the number of falls that take place as people leave the existing pews. The work is scheduled to take place in the summer months. This will mean that Morning Worship will take place in the St Matthew Hall in July, August and possibly into September. Crèche and Sunday Club will be relocated to the Cluny Hall, and after-Church teas and coffees will be served in the Braid Hall. For the duration of the work the sanctuary will be unavailable.

June Communion

The June Communion will be held on Sunday 2nd June at 9.30am and 10.30am in the Church. If there are members of the congregation who would like communion but cannot attend Church, please contact the Minister and he will be happy to take communion to members' homes. There is something powerfully intimate about a home communion, so if you would like this service, please let him know.

HOW OUR CHURCH MAKES A DIFFERENCE

Who would miss us if our Church wasn't here? Well, more people than you might think.

Our Church provides a wonderful place of worship for our congregation, for Sunday Club, for the community and for many who attend our worship without joining, for the people who join us at Christmas, Easter or when they are visiting family in Edinburgh, and serves as a base from which to provide services and pastoral visits to the breadth of our parish.

Our Church provides a home at the heart of Morningside for concerts and community events and lectures. It's a base for the Scouts, Guides and Boys Brigade/Girls Association and the Cubs, Beavers, and Brownies that feed into them. From early morning to late evening we accommodate the activities, societies and groups that provide fellowship, vitality and social cohesion in Morningside. Our vibrant Baby and Toddler groups , our country dancers, orchestras and local societies all make us their base. We are a home for crafters, for support groups like Alcoholics Anonymous, Speakability, South Morningside Primary School services, and numerous organisations use our Church and its halls with literally thousands of people crossing our threshold weekly.

Our members welcome locals in for coffee after our services as well as every week on Wednesday mornings. We open our doors for speaker suppers and outreach events, for afternoon teas and autumn lectures, for Christian Aid and Holy Week. Beyond our walls, our members play vital roles in many charities like Edinburgh Clothing Store, Bethany Care Shelter, Scottish Love in Action and the Open Door. We support the wider work of the Church of Scotland. Without us, there would be a yawning gap at the heart of Morningside.



What does it take to run our Church?

Running an active Church inevitably costs. It takes around £344,000 each year to run, heat and maintain our Church and employ the staff who carry out the day-to-day running and servicing of the building.

In recent years we have taken a hard look at our costs. This was behind our consolidation to a single Church site, while maintaining our central role in the community. This summer we are investing in a new

heating system and LED lighting in the Church, both of which will deliver cheaper running costs and safety benefits. Making our sanctuary more flexible opens up new opportunities to host

events and concerts. Our staff have taken on increased responsibilities but providing well maintained premises, running our services and taking our care to people's homes means we need to increase what we give financially to support our current levels of staff and expenditure.



Our Church and Halls allow us to generate rental income of £40,000. Our reserves, prudently invested, produce another £40,000 of income. To balance the books, the rest of our income, some £264,000, have to come from regular congregational giving and donations and tax recovered as a result.

If we divided that giving target equally across our active members, and took out donations from organisations and tax recovery, we would each have to contribute £927

per annum to the Church. Sadly, we don't. So the figures don't add up. In 2019 we are predicting we will have to fund a shortfall of £90,000 from our reserves.

That can't go on. We cannot keep raiding our reserves. If we want to sustain an active, faithful, community-serving Church, to bridge the gap we all need to increase giving.

What does our Giving look like?

Most of our members give to the Church by standing order or by free will offering scheme (blue envelopes). Such regular committed giving allows us to budget, and to claim 25% tax refund where the donor adds gift aid. Last year we reclaimed some £26,000 in tax refunds. But tax refunds depend on our giving in the first place.



Across the congregation giving levels vary hugely. The table on the previous page shows 61% of our contributing members give under £10 per week and 20% give less than £4 per week. The cost of running our Church needs giving at £17.84 per week.

If you look at that as an annual sum, 50% of our contributing members give less than £400 a year. Only 32% give over £600 per annum. Only 14% pay their share of our costs. We need average annual giving to be £927 to pay our way, and we're just not facing up to that. Not everybody could pay that and our giving has to reflect what we each can realistically afford without creating financial difficulties – but if there is scope to increase giving this would be gratefully appreciated.

The question we need to answer is, 'are we making a realistic contribution and bearing our fair share, given our individual resources and our promise to the Church to devote time, talents and money to its work?'



At the same time, our records show that over the past four years, most members haven't adjusted their level of giving. Many of us contribute no more than we did 10 years ago. 56% of donors contribute the same or less than they did in 2015, but during that same period the state pension has gone up 11%. We haven't adjusted our standing order or the contribution in the blue envelopes. For other things like utilities or retail goods, what we pay goes up regularly, with increases set by the provider. But for the Church, keeping pace with inflation requires each of us to take

action, and sometimes we don't get round to it. We forget, put off, or ignore. So we need to ask, 'has our giving kept pace with inflation?' And if not, what are we going to do about it?

Some people don't contribute at all - they're happy to be a member, attend Church, enjoy worship and fellowship but leave funding and volunteering to others. If we care about our Church, and want to be a part of it, we have an obligation to play, and pay, our part.



What do we each need to do?

Our Church is running a huge deficit of £90,000 this year. A large part of the problem is our giving is too low. Lower than we see in some comparable Edinburgh churches. Lower than what's needed to fund Morningside's ministry, outreach, and to maintain our busy Church life. First, we need to take action. Too often we postpone and prevaricate. The time to address this is now.

Second, we need to look at what we give and what it costs to run our Church and decide if our giving is at a realistic level. Please look at what is needed, not what you have given historically. If it's not realistic, if it's not paying our share, ask what you could be giving now?

And if you give as couple, please don't assume two for the price of one is the right answer! Each member is a member in their own right, with the same obligations to our Church.

Third, we need to ask ourselves if we've updated our giving for inflation over the years? If not, now is the time to catch up.

Fourth, we need to address how we sort this situation going forward. One way we're looking at is moving from standing orders, which are fixed sum, to direct debit, where we suggest to you each year an inflation uplift to your giving each year. Just like most charities and membership organisations.

Fifth, can we make it easier to support particular areas of our Church life that may particularly appeal to you? We are establishing dedicated funds for four areas - (1) our choir and music; (2) our pastoral care and outreach support; (3) Sunday Club and working with young people ; (4) floodlighting, grounds and maintenance.

Would you be willing to give more if you could specify it was dedicated to supporting one of these areas? If so, what would you be willing to do?

Sixth, please think about helping your Church in future through a legacy. A good number of enhancements to our Church, or the funding of areas and attributes that individuals have particularly valued, have been made possible by legacies. Could your legacy bring joy to others long after you? It's a great way to help the Church without impacting your income today.

And lastly, having thought carefully about what you are willing to do in response to this appeal, please get on and do it. **It's not tomorrow's problem, it's today's.**

Morningside United Church has hosted a Christian Aid Book sale for several years. The sale acts as a focal point for Morningside and the surrounding communities. There are also other sales at St Andrew's and St George's West

and at City of Edinburgh Methodist Church in Nicholson Square.

Although the Holy Corner Book sale is hosted by Morningside United Church, we work closely with Christ Church and many of our volunteers come from other local Churches. Last year we raised more than £16,000 for Christian Aid during the week of the sale and it provided an opportunity for people to come together with a shared interest, whether as volunteers or customers.

I would like to extend an invitation to members of your congregation to become involved with the book sale activities. We have already started collecting, sorting and pricing books for May's sale. In addition, during the week of the sale there are ample opportunities for volunteers to tidy the stock, chat to customers and generally become part of the Holy Corner Booksale Team.
