
bereavement, and taking care of people around you. Fred was also an ordained Presbyterian minister, and I met him through a mutual friend who brought Fred to our church some years ago.

Whomever you've been thinking about, how pleased they must be to know the difference you feel they've made. You know, they're the kind of people television does well to offer our world."



Perhaps when you've finished reading this short thought, you might take

those ten seconds to remember all of those people who have cared about you and wanted what was best for you life. People from the past, and people from the present. Ten seconds of silence, and gratitude.

OCTOBER KIRK SESSION

The October meeting was a Zoom meeting.

The Kirk Session heard a report about our new streaming service, which has allowed people to watch Sunday services, the Autumn Lectures, and one funeral to-date, online. We are grateful to Douglas Paterson and David Calder for being the first to learn how to operate the system, and we will be looking for other volunteers to help soon.

Though current restrictions have postponed a wider reopening of the halls, work has been completed to prepare contracts, risk assessments and Covid awareness regulations for those who let our halls when restrictions ease.

Session noted papers from the Presbytery about Planning for the Future, supplemented by a report from the October General Assembly. The Church across Scotland is embarked upon significant change at local, regional and national levels, driven by the need to balance the need for ministry and mission against the changing demographic of church membership and financial challenges which were growing and now underlined by the pandemic. These changes, as they are developed, will have an impact on all churches, including our own.

Outreach Committee: reported on arrangements to support the Edinburgh Clothing Store which were agreed by the Session, and mentioned in an article in this magazine.

Property Committee: work has been done on the church roof, and some stonework remains to be completed. The north steps have their yellow highlighted nosings to make movement on the steps, particularly in darker evenings, easier. Work to check the various alarm systems around the church has been completed. The caretakers have begun the annual autumn clean of gutters to remove leaves and silt.

Pastoral Committee: our Pastoral Assistant reported on ongoing work to support our members through telephone, cards and email contact, and also the 'hands-free' delivery of flowers to those who have had a bereavement, or have been unwell. Ongoing restrictions about visiting make pastoral work challenging, but it is ongoing. The Minister is still able to make face-to-face visits when arranging funerals, either in the Church or at the Manse.

Education Committee: Zoom meetings of Sunday Club continue on Sunday mornings, and are appreciated by our young people. Our grateful thanks to Norma Wilson and Rona McLaren for keeping up with this work.

Worship Committee: General reports about the 10.30am services have been good, although the limitations around what can and cannot be done continue to be challenging. The seating arrangement cannot be altered as the current layout was specifically measured to meet social distancing regulations. The Remembrance Sunday service will take place on 8th November at 10.30am, culminating with the Act of Remembrance around 11am. The service will still last for around half an hour. Discussion about what might be possible for a communion service in December is ongoing, with the likelihood that a recorded service will be made available online. Discussion about how Christmas will be celebrated this year also took place, with a variety of possibilities, but it was recognised that so much will be dictated by whatever regulations are still in place that a decision will be made in November.

Communications Committee: Given ongoing restrictions and uncertainty about the nature and timing of services around Christmas, it was decided not to deliver a Christmas leaflet this year.

Presbytery Elder: A Zoom meeting of Presbytery took place on 8th September. It was decided to postpone Local Church Reviews until face-to-face meetings could take place. The Defibrillator

Project has purchased 23 defibrillators and 26 external cabinets. A good spread has been achieved across the city. Contactless Terminals for fundraising are being trialled in the Presbytery. One of the contactless units will be in Morningside Parish Church (see Treasurer's article below).



IT'S ON THE CARDS!

Last year the Church of England introduced contactless giving in several dioceses as an additional means of enabling congregations to make donations to their Church in an easy way. The introduction of contactless terminals has been deemed a great success in many Churches as we move to an increasingly cashless society.

The Church of Scotland is now considering the introduction of contactless giving across Scotland and the Presbytery of Edinburgh is about to conduct a 3-month trial of contactless giving devices in a few selected congregations within the Presbytery.

Morningside Parish Church has been chosen to take part in this trial, with Presbytery covering the costs of the trial. If we wish to proceed with it after the trial we will be able to keep it as a permanent feature within the Church.

Contactless giving is not intended to replace traditional means of giving such as Free Will Offering, Standing Orders, and the Open Plate but it will be useful for those times when members and visitors wish to make a donation to the Church and have no cash with them but do have a debit or credit card to tap on the front of the device like in shops.

It could also be useful for organisations using our Halls in future who may wish to make occasional donations towards the upkeep of the Church.

If you are at Church in the coming weeks, look out for the "CollecTin" pictured.



AUTUMN WORSHIP SERIES

The new live-streaming facility enabled us to bring our popular autumn worship with talks series, held jointly with our friends at Greenbank Parish Church, to a wider audience. Four very different presentations from Adam Bruce, Richard Holloway, Sheena McDonald and Allan Little and James Naughtie brought an interesting range of approaches to examining what lessons have been learned during Lockdown and what the world will be like beyond it. While numbers attending in person were limited by government guidelines, there was no such limit to numbers watching online which reached over 300.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY 2020

The Minster, as a former Moderator, and the Session Clerk, Robin Stimpson, as a Commissioned Elder, attended the 2020 General Assembly in October. Robin submitted this report to the October Kirk Session:-

This year, because of the Covid pandemic, the General Assembly did not meet in full session in May as usual but held a virtual meeting on the evening of Friday 2nd October and all day Saturday 3rd October. Significant work had obviously been involved in setting up an IT system which not only live streamed the proceedings but also allowed all commissioners the opportunity of voting on the many deliverances from home. Generally the technology worked well but not without the occasional blip and delay. It was also helpful if you had 2 or 3 screens available to allow you to have readily available not just the live broadcast, but also the voting hub and ideally a screen for the full committee reports.

Normally the business of the Assembly is spread over six days so an Assembly of less than 1.5 days necessarily needed to focus on the main issues. Even then, the business covered was substantial with reports extending to 123 pages and supportive papers of another 77 pages! Understandably, because of pressure of time a large percentage of the reports related to necessary reporting of facts and figures, changes of personnel and the necessary updating of procedures. However there was still time for interesting presentations and discussion.

The current problems facing the Church were the main focus of the report of the Assembly Trustees and other reports.

A Radical Plan to address these issues is needed. Already a new post of Chief Officer has been established to prepare an action plan and the four central church Councils have been reduced in number and size to two smaller Forums with the suggestion that consideration should be given to reducing them further to a single forum. The central office budget has been reduced by £4m which has included voluntary redundancies and giving the individuals remaining a wider range of responsibility. The future of the building at 121 continues to be under review but has currently been paused, partly because of the Covid pandemic and the likelihood of changed working patterns in the future, and partly because of the uncertainty of the impact of the development of larger Presbyteries on central staffing needs. A report on the 121 building is to come to Assembly 2021.

The priorities for both the Faith Action Forum and Faith Nurture Forum are based on the Church's Vision Statement –

The Church of Scotland seeks to inspire the people of Scotland and beyond with the Good News of Jesus Christ through enthusiastic worshipping, witnessing, nurturing and serving communities

And the 5 Marks of Mission, expressed as follows -

- To proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom
- To teach baptise and nurture new believers
- To respond to human need by loving service
- To seek to transform unjust structures of society, to challenge violence of every kind and pursue peace and reconciliation
- To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustains and renew the life of the earth.

A review of Ministry & Mission (M&M) contributions is underway and it is anticipated that overall M&M contributions will be reduced by 18%. No congregation's M&M allocation will increase in 2021 and the shortfall in funding will be meet by withdrawing £8m from reserves. The group reviewing M&M contributions has concluded that local congregations have little understanding, or say, in how money raised is allocated and spent. Any new system should aspire to be fair, transparent, easy to understand, adaptable, a driver of change, an incentive to mission and effective but further work is needed to establish the new system.

A drive for "robust" Presbytery planning is needed and congregations need to "get real" on the likely shape of church going forward.

This is also a drive to create larger Presbyteries which can be better resourced to undertake its responsibilities. Larger Presbyteries have already been created e.g. by linking Presbyteries to create the Presbyteries of Aberdeen and Shetland; Clyde; and Fife. There has still to be worked out the appropriate cost sharing between central funding and Presbytery funding

"Well equipped spaces in the right places" was approved from the report from the General Trustees which has of course been the rationale for the work which we have undertaken at Morningside. However it was also agreed that in future, from the sale proceeds of redundant properties, the levy of 10% would be applied on any part of the sale proceeds which created a surplus in a congregation's capital reserves greater than £75k. At Morningside we were therefore fortunate that the regime then applicable permitted the proceeds of sales to be used in full by the congregation if they could demonstrate that they had a development scheme ready to be implemented and capital receipts were not destined to rest in reserves.

This is obviously a personal and brief overview by one commissioner of some of the main features of a very different Assembly. A lot of business went through but inevitably because of the restricted time it had to focus on the highlights and on obtaining Assembly approval. Perhaps it lacked the interest of hearing reports on some of the wider activities the church undertakes or guest speakers or the singing at the opening of each day's business, but nevertheless it was clear that tremendous work had been done using technology successfully to keep the wider church directly informed and involved in the significant efforts being made to address the problems facing the Church .

WORSHIP MATTERS

Remembrance Sunday

Assuming current restrictions about numbers attending worship will continue for the time being, the Remembrance Sunday Service will take place on Sunday 8th November at 10.30am, and will culminate with the Act of Remembrance around 11am, so slightly different from our normal format. Sadly we will not be able to have a bugler or piper present this year. The wreaths, will, however, still be laid at the war memorials in the Church.

Sunday services

At time of writing restrictions about numbers and social distancing are still in place. There are 40 places available in Church each Sunday. You *MUST* book your space through the Church Office. Please do not turn up on Sunday and assume you will be able to attend the service. Booking continues to be fairly brisk!

Services are now live-streamed each Sunday at 10.30am, (follow the link on the Church website), and we continue to experiment with this new format. We also continue to record the half-hour 10.30am service each Sunday, and the order of service and sermon can also be read. The shorter service at 10.30am will continue into November.

The 9.30am service remains suspended at the moment, as do the normal Sunday rotas, the choir, Sunday after-service teas and coffees.

There are a number of safety and hygiene issues, all of which are extensively noted in the weekly intimations, and on the Church website.

Sunday Club and Crèche

The hope remains to meet in Church as soon as is safe to do so, but in the meantime we will run Sunday Club virtually. The intention is to re-engage with a Zoom call with all age groups, where we discuss lockdown and invite the children to show us something they have made during the last six months or so. Thereafter, and subject to numbers, we will look to separate the calls into primary and secondary school age-groups, and work through the Spill the Beans materials.

The Church and Halls currently remain generally closed to the public except for events in the Sanctuary. Emails and phone calls are dealt with by our Church Administrator. A security, maintenance check and cleaning are regularly carried out at the Church by our caretakers. Information has recently come from the national Church of Scotland and the Presbytery of Edinburgh about protocols concerning how we might be able to move forward with reopening our Halls, but the advice is also balanced by reminding us not simply to reopen because it may be possible, but to be sure it is practical and sustainable. Significant issues relate to the 'through traffic' around our halls, and the time needed to clean them and 'air' them between lets. Alongside this the Kirk Session is mindful that there are ongoing financial considerations for the congregation if we do not reopen to hall lets, but staff costs incurred if we do, and this requires careful thought and balancing. Please remember that no-one tasked into thinking about these matters is trained in handling the consequences of a pandemic, but all are doing their best to ensure the well-being of the church and its staff in what remain difficult times. The decisions being made are not easy ones, and we continue to ask for your understanding, and your prayers.

CHURCH FLOWERS

The decision was taken at the start of lockdown to suspend the provision of fresh flowers in the church pending the resumption of normal services. As those of you watching the services on-line will have noticed, silk flowers were purchased from the Flower Fund and are currently being changed on a seasonal basis. A limited number of hands-free flower deliveries are now taking place when deemed appropriate by the Minister. These are being financed by monies received for the provision of flowers in the church over this period.



FRESH START

Very sadly, homelessness in the year ending March 2020 has increased by 3.5% according to the Scottish Government's Statistics. As many will know Fresh Start was set up 20 years ago to enable people who have been homeless resettle in the community. Fresh Start has provided goods and services to ensure vulnerable people have essential household goods to help them set up a home and improve the likelihood of them sustaining it successfully.

Fresh Start has been working extremely hard during this crisis (and in partnership with other charities). When Lockdown began in March, Fresh Start had to react quickly to the needs of those most vulnerable people in our society and change its ways of working to provide Emergency Food Packs, Starter packs, cleaning and toiletry packs in response to the sudden and unprecedented need in the community. There is an ever growing need for food and the basics necessary for survival.

The lockdown meant that Fresh Start had to stop taking donations of goods for Starter Packs for safety reasons but it is now open again from week beginning **Monday 26**th **October** to receive the specific goods listed below. THE CROSS

I wish to thank the congregation for allowing me to erect the cross in my chosen position, and with the kind agreement of our Minister. The cross originated in memory of probably one of my best friends. (There are not many men I think would say this about their mother in law!)

Margaret's mother was an inspiration and supported Margaret and me all our married life. When she died, Margaret donated a small silver communion set to the church to enable the housebound in our congregation to be given communion. We both felt this was an excellent way to commemorate her.

Sometime later, and without telling Margaret, I thought that I also wanted to do something in Ivy's memory. I considered what were the most memorable things about her.

The first was laughter - I never visited her without laughing; 9 times out of 10 at her expense. She was always the one who laughed most even when she was the butt of the joke. Describing the amusing times we had would not do her memory justice.

The second thing was that she was a fanatical car washer. Whenever I visited her, if she knew I was coming I had hardly arrived before she started to wash the car. I worked on building sites and in the winter it was not unusual for there to be an inch of mud on the car, which she always managed to clean beautifully. However, a bucket and sponge does not make a suitable memorial either.

However, the third most memorable thing, and the most important thing to her after her family, was her Christianity. She did not just go to church; she lived her faith. If anything needed done in her church or out of it, she quietly went about getting it done with no fuss. A Christian cross seemed a fitting memorial for her, and I am sure that she would have approved and would be even happier that I had made it for her.

Ivy was born in the south of England to English parents but she always maintained that she was Scottish and did not welcome any suggestion that she was a Sassenach!

A Celtic cross therefore seemed the most appropriate. During my working life, I travelled all over Scotland and also Northern Ireland. I would often jump in the car after work and visit as many Celtic crosses as I could, looking for inspiration. It was at this time that I bought a small book with many Celtic crosses in it. One was a cross with a continuous line, starting at the foot of the cross and travelling all round it and ending up at the bottom. Over the page there was another almost identical with a line travelling all round and ending at the top.

I thought for a long time which to make. Having slept on it, I realised that Ivy's Christianity was not all convoluted but in fact was plain and simple, so the idea of a plain cross evolved.

I had not told Margaret that I intended to make a cross. Before I could do so I was diagnosed with cancer and underwent an operation which had side effects and, as all my cancer could not be completely taken out, continuous treatment. The cancer returned and at the same time Margaret had also been diagnosed. In fact, we ended up in the same ward. As this did not seem an appropriate time to tell her, I never did, which I now very much regret. Margaret got worse and tragically died. The cross then had to commemorate two people.

As I'm now on my own with plenty time, I decided to design the cross for two good Christians both of whom had identical beliefs; indeed, were like two peas in a pod in many ways. I designed the cross you now see hanging in the church to reflect their beliefs.

I will explain the final design when the cross is dedicated.
