Dear Friends

Jonathan Sacks tells a story of an old rabbi looking out over the town square.

Everywhere he saw people rushing. He called out to one man, 'What are you rushing for?' The man replied, 'I'm running to make a living.' The rabbi responded, 'What makes you so sure that your livelihood is in front of you so that you have to rush to catch it up? What if it's behind you? Maybe you should stop and let it catch up with you.'

In or out of lockdown, people in our time have filled their days, hours, moments with endless activity. It has been a surprising reality that most of us can still be working flat out at our jobs and lives even when we were largely restricted to our homes. For many it has been exhausting. Too

many people feel endlessly pressurized trying to juggle home and work, family and career, ambition and recreation. We run in order to stand still. Often the harder we work, the harder we feel the need to work. We can find ourselves so busy making a living that we never seem to have the time simply to enjoy being alive. When do we stop to let our blessings catch up with us?

This is why holy times are important. I found Holy Week, even without a congregation

present in the building, such a time. I found Easter Sunday, with a congregation present, such a time. Where things seemed, for a moment, to slow down and we focussed on worship. For those short times, for me at least, the pressures of the outside world disappear and life becomes simpler and more serene. In older times observing the Sabbath was corrective to the need to be at work all of the time. Today it is an antidote to stress, the most effective I know.



Worship, as a form of rest, sets priorities in perspective. When life becomes an uninterrupted succession of pressures, we lose the natural rhythms of life, work and rest, striving and relaxing, creating and enjoying. Sometimes we travel so

fast we completely miss the view. Sometimes we are so wrapped up in our own lives we fail to notice the person we live with, or sit next to, or work beside. At regular intervals we need to stop, pause, and breathe deeply. Happiness needs tranquillity. As that old rabbi said, it is right there behind us, waiting for us to rest so that it can catch us up.

APRIL KIRK SESSION

The April meeting was a Zoom meeting.

Emerging from Lockdown: In person worship resumed on Easter Day with social distancing, restrictions on numbers attending, and advance booking. The Moderator was unaware of any imminent changes to the Scottish Government's regulations, so for the time being, in person worship will continue in this fashion. There has, however, been some resumption of activity in the Church and halls with the return of the After School Club when the schools reopen, and plans for the sanctuary to be used as a vaccination station and as a Polling Station for the upcoming election.

Property: Moira Clark, Convenor reported that there had been some problems with lighting in the office and Cluny Hall which have now been fixed. Problems with the electricity meter continue, certain health and safety issues have been identified, but it appears that any action will require Scottish Power's involvement.

Pastoral: Doreen Reekie, Convenor reported that due to the restrictions of the lockdown little has changed, visitors cannot visit in person but do keep in touch through regular phone calls. Doreen too regularly keeps in contact with people who are on their own or would welcome a call. She has prepared welcome packs in preparation for when she can visit people again.

Pastoral Assistant: Jacqui Lindsay reported that she continues to contact people, in line with restrictions, through phone, email, and letter, as well as delivering flowers. She noted that many people were grateful for contact with her or their Elder.

Communications: The Moderator reported that there are plans for delivery of printed copies of the May Church Magazine, but due to Covid restrictions this would have to be delivery only, not a visit.

Education: The Moderator thanked the Sunday Club and uniformed organisations for their wonderful work in decorating the 'Easter Tree' in front of the Church and for the two tableaux in the windows of the Cluny and Braid Halls.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY 2021

There will be another online General Assembly in May this year, a slightly shorter event. The Assembly will run from Saturday 22nd May – 10am-12noon and 1-3.30pm; Monday 24th May – Thursday 27th May – 1-3.30pm and 4-6pm. It is not clear if there will be an Assembly service yet on Sunday 23rd May. The Minister will be presenting a report to the Assembly on Monday afternoon, on The Effectiveness of Presbyterian Government.

The Moderator of the General Assembly will be Lord James Wallace of Tankerness, an elder from Orkney's St Magnus Cathedral (and former leader of the Scottish Liberal Democrats). The Lord High Commissioner will be Prince William, Earl of Strathearn (as he's known in Scotland).

You will be able to watch the proceedings on line at the Church of Scotland website when the General Assembly is live.

WORSHIP MATTERS

It's wonderful to have the Church even partially reopened for worship at the 10.30am service. The restrictions at the moment are for a maximum of 50 people in attendance, wearing face-coverings, socially distanced and not singing. You know the drill! Places must be booked via the church office by phone or by email.

We stay with the restrictions until they are lifted. The 9.30am service will not restart until the autumn. Hopefully the next stages to returning to the more usual service will be, in time, unrestricted attendance, no face coverings, and singing. We wait in hope!

At the time of writing it is still not clear that a 'normal' communion will be possible in June.

Over this long, difficult period, a sincere word of thanks to those who have kept worship going, either in the restricted format, or during the two lockdowns. A number of people have played up-front roles, and behind-thescenes roles in what have been particularly challenging circumstances. Who would have thought that the cameras put in so tentatively a few years ago would have been so useful to us over these last months. Grateful thanks to everyone involved.

EASTER YARN BOMBING BY THE SUNDAY CLUB AND FRIENDS

What is Yarn Bombing? It can be described as a type of graffiti or street art that uses colourful displays of knitted or crocheted yarn.

We wanted it to be tasteful! I was inspired after seeing it in other churches in Edinburgh and Midlothian during the festive season before we were unable to move outwith our Health Board Area. For example, Priestfield Parish Church had angels, Roslin Parish Church had Christmas trees - seeing them made me hopeful that things would get better and it felt good to see them.



I suggested at the Session Meeting about 8 weeks ago that I thought it would be good to do something like that at Morningside at Easter. There were a few puzzled faces but we were given the go ahead so at the beginning of Lent we put the idea to the young people in Sunday Club and they started making yellow pompoms to turn into Easter chicks. Knowing that they might not be able to knit or crochet we appealed to the wider Congregation through the Church Magazine - in particular to the housebound - to help us in knitting eggs. The 188th Guides also helped by making pompoms.



We amassed somewhere in the region of 200 eggs, chicks and pompoms which were used to decorate the cherry tree at the corner of Cluny Gardens and Braid Road. As Norma Wilson and I decorated the tree on Maundy Thursday, lots of passers-by stopped to comment, saying "what a lovely idea. It's really cheerful in what has been a terrible year". And some intended to return bringing their families to see the tree.

In addition to the "bombing" of the tree, we created two knitted friezes, one in the Braid Hall window showing Jesus on the Cross and the other in the Cluny Hall window showing the Empty Tomb.


It was hard work but good fun - and we got all generations of Morningside Parish interacting with each other - superb. Thanks to everyone who helped.

with hospital and nursing home visits are still not possible, but we hope, if things keep moving forward, that visiting will be possible in the not too distant future.


