They keep you holding on, they keep you going, they keep you wondering, they keep you wishing, they keep you hoping, and the keep you believing.


None of us can predict how the next weeks will turn out, let alone the next year. Yet in this


awful time, Easter will take place. Persistent. Undeniable. Irrepressible. Steady. Enough.

HOLY WEEK 11 – 16 APRIL, 7.30PM

This year we will be sharing our Holy Week services with our neighbours at Greenbank Parish Church. The theme for the week will be 'The Places of Holy Week'. On Maundy Thursday, 14 April, we will share the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. Good Friday is on 15 April and the choirs of the two churches will take part in the service.

Holy Saturday is on 16 April, and the service of music and words will be held in our Church at 7.30pm. It is a thoughtful service as we stand poised between the bleakness of Good Friday and the positivity of Easter's hope.

Easter Day is on 17 April. There is just the one service at 10.30am (no 9.30am service on this day). Do come and join us to celebrate the resurrection of our Saviour.

Choral Evensong

Our choir is providing a service of Choral Evensong at 6.30pm on Sunday 24 April. More details elsewhere in the magazine as well as in the intimations nearer the time.

WORSHIP MATTERS

Hopefully by the time you are reading this the regulations around services and events at Church will have changed. Please check the church website for the most up-to-date information. From 21 March:

- the need to record attendance at events will be lifted
- face coverings will still be required at least until the beginning of April
- we continue with physical distancing in Church until further notice, at both the 9.30 and 10.30 services.
- we will continue to have the entire service printed in the order of service.
 This has gone down well in recent months, and also means that those watching online will be able to follow the order of service as it appears on the church website
- the offering will continue to be taken at the door (plates available before and after the service), but also please remember the electronic device you can 'tap' in the vestibule to make a one-off offering
- four at a table for coffee in the St Matthew Hall (for the moment)
- a return of the Jam and Baking stall at the end of April (we hope)

MARCH KIRK SESSION

From its Zoom meeting in March

- Congregational Annual Report and Accounts the Treasurer, Chris McNeil, with Anne
 Campbell from Stripe Accountants, presented the annual report and accounts for the Kirk
 Session to approve. After what has been a challenging year, congregational giving has
 kept up well, but a particular effort will be needed to deal with the challenges presented
 by increases in energy bills in 2022, as well as the rise in inflation. We hope to hold a
 congregational meeting in the next few months where the report and accounts will be
 available to the congregation. The Kirk Session approved the report and accounts, and
 Chris McNeil and Anne Campbell, were warmly thanked for their much valued work.
- Emerging from Lockdown as mentioned elsewhere, we hope that most of the restrictions around church services and events at church will be lifted or made optional before long.
- Presbytery Planning Proposals the Kirk Session's response to the proposals made in the Presbytery Planning was discussed. It was appreciated that the macro picture across Edinburgh and West Lothian had to be taken into account to balance a multitude of considerations facing the Church of Scotland nationally. This in the light of last year's General Assembly decision to reduce ministries by 40% by 2025. Morningside Parish Church has undergone five unions in the last 60 years and knows something about the reality of the pain and the opportunity that dealing with unions, and the disposal of buildings, and the imaginative use of monies raised by sales, can bring. We appreciate that for other churches who haven't faced unions the choices will be difficult. Our response has tried to be unflinchingly honest and relentlessly gracious.

In relation to the proposed union with Reid Memorial – although there has been no historic link between our two churches, whilst our history of bringing people together in welcome and hospitality is clearly evidenced, there was no appetite to take on the running of another large building. The sale of the Reid buildings in any newly formed parish could create a special fund to support and enhance pastoral and mission opportunities, and might also be used to provide transport around the larger parish. However, we are sensitive that this proposal would be a difficult one for the Reid congregation. Some consideration was given to a union or working together between Morningside and Greenbank (where we have longer links). This would also raise opportunities as well as challenges in the sharing of staff and resources, and also the question of maintaining two separate buildings would still arise. It was recognised that essential further and detailed conversation would need to take place with all congregations as we seek to define a sustainable vision for the future.

Property – pending work on the Fire and Security systems at the Church and manse
were discussed and approved, to bring the systems up to date and to meet new
Government requirements. Work on the south aisle/Braid Hall corridor was notified, with
costs being sought to carry out the necessary repair work.


