ponder or decide and act. Seeing in each moment the clear or shadowy presence of God-with-us, Jesus.



CHRISTMAS TREE FESTIVAL

10th – 14th December, 10am-4pm (on Sunday 11th during services only)

We hope to see you at what is a new venture for us: a kind of an open day to let the community see our premises; also an opportunity for the public to see what organisations offer in our church, its rooms and in our community.

So far, we have twelve groups who will each decorate a tree in a style that reflects what their organisation does. They might hand out leaflets, give information or encourage the public to support their efforts by joining them or volunteering to help them.

William Purves is our major sponsor and will have a tree, as will the charities our church supports: Edinburgh Clothing Store and the Pad Project. Both Brownie groups and the Guides who meet in our space are involved, as is the Wednesday Club, Morningside Hope, the Sunday Club and the Friends of Morningside Parish Church. Dunedin Dancers, the Open Door and South Morningside School are also participating.

Saturday 10th December will be the main day when, in addition to the trees, we will be offering refreshments (£3 for coffee/tea and a mince pie). We will also have a raffle and a craft fair. Entry to the event itself is free.

We hope for an entertaining display and it would be good to see you there.

NOVEMBER KIRK SESSION

From its meeting in November:

Presbytery Reform: The Moderator reported that Presbytery would meet on 15 November, 3 members from each congregation have been cited to attend and it is hoped to get agreement at that meeting to the whole Presbytery Plan. There are 9 Mission Districts in the Presbytery. Most objections appear to be about the future of buildings. The Principal Clerk has pointed out that approval of a Presbytery plan is only the start of the process and implementation may result in some tweaking of proposals. It is possible that a review can be called for by a dissatisfied congregation but the appeal can only be considered if it can be demonstrated that the process was flawed.

The Moderator advised that he had met the ministers of Fairmilehead and St John's Colinton Mains and plans soon to meet the new interim Moderator for Greenbank and the new Associate about to be ordained at Greenbank.

(Subsequent to the Kirk Session, the Presbytery of Edinburgh and West Lothian approved its Mission Plan on 15 November, and it has now been sent to the central Church authorities for consideration.)

Pastoral Committee – Doreen Reekie, Convener, advised that a Pastoral Visitors Group meeting had been held, an opportunity for them to report on their visits. There has been a number of deaths amongst those visited but arrangements have been made for new people to be visited.

The convener has delivered ten Welcome Packs which takes a lot of time to achieve.

After 12 years Doreen has handed over the management of the Wednesday coffee mornings to David Calder and Lesley Murphy. She wishes them well and hoped that Session would continue to support them. The Moderator thanked Doreen for her years of service in this role and reported at the last Wednesday coffee morning Doreen had been presented with flowers and a special cake had been shared with those attending. He suggested that Wednesday coffee morning was an incarnation of what MPC aspires to - being friendly, welcoming and inclusive and now attracts attendance from church members, the community, patients from the Royal Edinburgh and visited by the Community Police recognising it as a community group. The thanks of the Session were expressed in a spontaneous round of applause.

Outreach – Kim Milne, Convener reminded Session that it was our practice to support three charities - the Church, the Edinburgh Clothing Store and for a two year period a third charity, currently the Pad Project. However, because of Covid restrictions the sums raised had been significantly lower and she suggested, and Session agreed, that sponsorship of the Pad Project should continue for a third year.

Warm Hub – the Kirk Session is considering the possibility of our Church being open as a 'Warm Hub'. There are many issues needing to be considered about how this might be done. It would be over and above what is effectively a Warm Hub at the regular Wednesday coffee morning. The Session will continue consideration in December.

THE OPEN DOOR

The Open Door was founded 40 years ago by Peggy Hunter with the support of the Morningside Churches. Morningside Parish Church has always had representation on the organisation's Board of Trustees. For a long time it was Helen Buist. I, Euan Murray, took Helen's place in 2014 at the invitation of our minister, Derek Browning. At the AGM of The Open Door at the end of October this year, Nigel Griffiths stood down as Chair and I took his place.

For all of our 40 years, The Open Door has been at the heart of the Morningside community, reducing isolation and loneliness through friendship, support and love. It is heavily reliant on volunteers. At the beginning, everyone was a volunteer and it was two years before we employed our first paid member of staff.

The pandemic changed things a lot. We were closed for 17 months and when we reopened it was initially a bit on-and-off. During that time, our pool of volunteers shrank enormously because people were no longer able - or were still reluctant - to go out. We are currently nowhere near up to strength in volunteers.

So, The Open Door invites you to consider volunteering with us - and please also ask people you know - volunteering with a friend is even better than being on your own!

And I know you'll enjoy it too - it's fulfilling, worthwhile and fun. The Open Door has a sign up on the wall which says "Care, Love, Laughter" and a lot of laughter comes from our volunteers.
