#### **Dear Friends**

I came fairly late to taking on board 'the Christian year', that liturgical calendar of dates and seasons that some part of the Church has worked alongside for centuries. Yes, Christmas, Easter, Pentecost were all right, significant spiritual punctuation marks in the year, but it has only been as I got older that Advent and Epiphany, Lent and Ascension and Trinity grew a little more in significance.

As seasons change in nature, so they also change in the Church year. They point to underlying Bible stories and experiences that help us sometimes to bring a structure and order to things. Perhaps more importantly they ensure that we don't always look at the things we find easy and congenial in our faith, but also the things that we find awkward and unsettling.

Towards the end of February, we move from Epiphany, which starts with God being revealed in Jesus to the Magi in Bethlehem, through Transfiguration, the moment on the Mountain where Jesus is revealed shining in glory, between Moses representing the Law of the Old Testament and Elijah representing the prophecy of the Old Testament, to a bemused group of disciples who get a glimpse of what God might be like, and certainly what God stands for, in the here and now. Then on into the purple-dark hues of Lent, a time of introspection, and looking not only at Who and what God is, but also who

and what we are, and where we stand in the ongoing working out of our faith through our life.

For Christian faith to be textured and resilient it has to go through both bright and dark, both easy and hard, both comfortable and uncomfortable. It has to go through these things because if it is to be of any use or value to us in our living, then it has to be supple enough and nuanced enough to help us along the way. A faith that can only cope with the bouncy and cheery is as incomplete as a faith that can only wallow in the gloomy and dour.

There's a technique in the art world called *chiaroscuro*. It means 'light-dark' and involves the use of strong contrasts between light and dark, usually bold contrasts affecting the whole painting which give a sense of volume or three

dimensions to objects and figures in a painting.

We move from the brightness of Christmas and Epiphany and Transfiguration to the darkness of Lent. And then on again to the dazzling time of Easter.

Faith at work traverses light and dark and light – helping us face life as it is – and reminding us not only that nothing lasts forever, but that travelling through life, we are never on our own. God, as always, is with us.

#### **CHRISTMAS TREE FESTIVAL**

Very many thanks to everyone who was involved in helping in any way with our Christmas Tree Festival between 10 and 14 December. Though the weather was against us on the Saturday, a combination of church services and events, and three significantly large concerts on the Saturday, Tuesday and Wednesday evenings meant that around 600 people saw the wonderful trees, decorated by twelve groups involved with our Church.

It was so important for us to be reminded about the strength of involvement church and community have in supporting good causes and providing good

things across the community. Around £1,000 was raised for the church's charities, an astonishing figure since this event was not intended to be a major fundraiser, but more of an opportunity to showcase some of the activity in our community.

Thank you all so much for your involvement and support - it was truly magnificent.





#### **DECEMBER KIRK SESSION**

From its meeting in December:

Warm Spaces - The Moderator reported that he had made enquiries with St Michael's in Dalry and Corstorphine St Ninian's who had both offered Warm Spaces but, although the initiative was positively received as good for the Church's profile, no one came. The lack of attendees may be because their opening was in November when the weather was milder. He proposed that we should trial opening the sanctuary for the month of January on Mondays and Wednesdays from the reopening of the premises on 4 January, from 10.00am to 4.00pm as a "Warm Place for quiet reflection".

Stewardship & Finance - Chris McNeil, the Treasurer, presented the Budget for 2023. The budget had been reviewed by the Stewardship & Finance committee. It was noted that Covid had impacted on income, particularly on income from letting as some tenants had not returned and others had been slow to start in the new year. Tenants had also been affected by a slow return to the various classes. Rental income had however picked up on the autumn of 2022. It is proposed that the 2023 budget estimates income of £268,085 (compared with 2022 budget of £248,521 and forecast income to 31/12/ 2022 of £221,747).

The 2023 budgeted expenditure is estimated at £340,966 (2022 budget £315,521- forecast £294,633). This includes a contribution of £99,295 to "Giving to Grow" which replaces payments to "Ministries and Mission" which in 2022 were set at £102,843. Staff Salaries are to increase by 5% from January across the board and the caretakers also move up an incremental step on the University scale on which they are matched.

The budgeted operating deficit will be - £72,881 (2022 budget -£67,000- forecast - £72,886). In addition, Chris advised that Property costs for 2023 were estimated to be £36,200 (2022 budget £80,883- forecast £87,837). These sums would be met from our

substantial investments but Chris made the point that continuing to rely on them to balance the books could not be a long-term solution and in the meantime reduces our income from investments.

Session approved the budget as presented, with strong encouragement to see what could be done to increase rental and other income as we continue to emerge from the knock-on effect of lockdown.

Staff- Robin Stimpson, Convenor reported that in many ways 2022 has been a challenging year for our staff, largely arising from the uncertainties of, and gradual return to normal business after, the Covid pandemic. There were many changes over the months in the restrictions imposed or recommended to deal with the pandemic and our staff had to deal with the impact of these restrictions. This could involve changes in work requirements, and trying to encourage/enforce compliance on users of our premises. There were changes in the frequency of use of our premises by users, some of whom were slow in returning and some who did on short notice. We are very well served by our staff and we owe them our gratitude for all that they do.

**New Elders:** the Moderator was happy to report that five members of the congregation had agreed to become elders in the New Year. Details about their ordination and admission would be made available later.

Communications – Issie Paterson, Convenor reported that the Christmas Tree Festival had been successful notwithstanding the snowy weather conditions. Wm. Purves, undertakers, had sponsored the purchase of the twelve trees which had been decorated by various groups. The event was open until Thursday and funds raised, in particular from the Saturday event, had raised approximately £1,000 to date.

The Moderator thought it had been useful to attract the public into the church to showcase the building and to give information on the

activities undertaken. Indeed, some members found the information given of interest. The festival had overlapped with three events held in the church by Edinburgh Choral Union, the Telephone Choir and Marie Curie, each of which had drawn large numbers to their respective events. Grateful thanks were extended to all who had been involved in this new event for our Church.

Presbytery Elder's Report - The Clerk reported that after the special, and lengthy, meeting of Presbytery on 15 November when the new Presbytery Plan was considered and approved, the meeting on Tuesday 6 December was much shorter and returned to consideration of more routine business. Of particular interest was the welcome to Presbytery of the newly ordained Revd Julia Cato who has been appointed as Associate Minister at our neighbours at Greenbank. Also introduced to Presbytery among others as a candidate for the Ministry of Word and Sacrament was Michael McMullin who of course is currently based with us on attachment.

Presbytery plan –it had been reported that "the plan has now been sent to the relevant national committees. These are the General Trustees and the Presbytery Planning Implementation Group (PMPIG), which works under the umbrella of the Faith Nurture Forum (FNF). Their concurrence is required in order to move forward with the implementation of the plan. The General Trustees met on 21 November and some issues were raised regarding some of the building designations.

PMPIG met, as scheduled, on 24 November and then again on 28 November specifically to discuss and analyse the draft Presbytery Plan for Edinburgh and West Lothian. The feedback thus far is encouraging with only a few concerns highlighted.

As far as PMPIG is concerned, there are no 'major issues' but there are some 'conditions' to be carried out by the first annual review. At this point it is understood that some mission narratives will need to be strengthened and clarity provided regarding deferred unions. More will be reported to Presbytery after the next PMPIG meeting on 15 December.

A Review Panel of the General Trustees met on 5 December to discuss in greater detail the areas that have caused some concern. Typically, the opinions of the General Trustees are passed along to PMPIG and these would thus be available for PMPIG's meeting on 15 December. If, however, the concerns of the General Trustees are such that they feel that they cannot agree the plan, it is forwarded to PMPIG. Presbytery would then need to re-visit the plan in light of the General Trustees input."

However, the view expressed was that the indications were that no major modifications would be required but we would need to await the outcome of the Meeting on PMPIG on 15 December.

The Moderator advised that the next Moderator of Presbytery will be the Revd Moira Macdonald of Corstorphine Old Church.

The items which are needed are blankets of all sizes, hats for children and adults, jumpers, cardigans, scarves and all baby clothes. Everyone just uses their own patterns. Generally, we knit in bright colours as there may not be much opportunity for washing. The other projects we support are in hospitals here in Edinburgh, Glasgow, Paisley and Kirkcaldy for babies. Babies are given a woolly hat when they are born to keep their temperature steady. Some of the hospitals operate a traffic light system and give a baby a red yellow or green hat. This helps the busy staff immediately identify the babies who need extra care. However, baby knitting can also be in white if you get tired of bright colours! I can also use any wool if you have some lurking in a cupboard.



### In his article in the February issue on the impact of layout on worship, John Bell writes:

In churches like one I used to attend, a congregation of 40 sat scattered throughout a building with a seating capacity of 1200. One result was that the members, who came from a wide area, arrived and left with minimal interaction. Another was that nobody sang. It is a rule of thumb that if you sit more than a yard away from another person, you won't sing in case they hear you. Less than a yard away you are likely to sing because you hear them.

In that particular church no furniture was removed, but when blue cord roped off the balcony and the back ten pews, people sat together, talked to each other, sang confidently, shared leadership of worship and began to resemble the joined-up body of Christ rather than the scattered tribes of Israel. Attendance also increased.
