And I hope that all of you, on your own, or with your family, or with your friends, will have a happy Christmas and a peaceful New Year.

KIRK SESSION NEWS

The Kirk Session met in November:

Presbytery Plan - draft proposal: the Moderator introduced the draft proposal for the Parish Grouping in which our Church is located, along with Fairmilehead, Greenbank and St John's Colinton Mains. The approved Presbytery Plan indicates this partnership will be served by three full-time Ministers of Word and Sacrament (which we currently have with the vacancy at Greenbank), along with locally appointed staff. Under the plan all four church buildings will be retained. There will be a steady move towards looking at emerging proposals for the four churches to work together, which will include ways to recycle for good causes; coffee mornings/open days in the four churches as we get to know each other and our different approaches to ministry and parish work: a Men's Baking challenge: educational/study events, perhaps based on "What do we believe?" It was recognised that all four churches are currently fully engaged with their parishes and already busy, as well as being well-used by their communities. There was some discussion about whether or not the proposal went far enough, given the significant readjustments going on around the city, and indeed the rest of the country. It was pointed out that our church is already the result of a 5-way union, and St John's Colinton Mains is a more recent union. Session agreed broadly with the draft proposal as a way to begin moving the process forward.

Pastoral Care: Doreen Reekie, convener, reported on the work of the visiting group, particularly in relation to visiting members who were now resident in nursing homes, and also invited suggestions about other home-bound members who might like more regular visiting.

Stewardship and Finance: Robert Armour, convener, reported that the review of giving would be launched in the early part of next year, probably in February. It has been some years since we held such a review and this

would provide an opportunity for members and friends of the congregation to review their financial support of the church's work, as well as other ways to commit time and talent to our much-appreciated work.

Worship: the Moderator reported that the Worship Committee had met to review worship in the life of our congregation, and in particular the resumption of offering the Common Cup at Communion (mentioned elsewhere in this edition).

Outreach: Kimberly Milne, convener, updated the Session on discussions about reviewing the overseas charity we support. Over the last few years this charity has been the Pad Project and the monies we have raised have made a significant difference to the lives of girls and women through the provision of sanitary goods. The Outreach Committee proposed, and Session agreed, that the next overseas charity we will be supporting will be the David Nott Foundation, a charity that provides surgical training for overseas doctors, often in countries where training is limited and where help is needed most, particularly in countries where there is conflict. Training has been provided in Ukraine, Irag. Somaliland and other parts of the world. The fund also helps to train the trainers, who help make safer surgery a reality for more people worldwide.

Presbytery Elder: Robert Armour reported on the meeting of 7th November where the Presbytery of Edinburgh and West Lothian met. The 2024 Giving to Grow allocation for Morningside to the wider work of the church will be £103,573. This funding helps supports congregations who need support in our inner cities, and also in the remoter rural areas, as well as other national and international church work. In relation to the Presbytery Mission Plan, Presbytery has approved nine unions (involving sixteen congregations), nine Reviewable Charge appointments and one Parish Grouping. More are in preparation.

Presbytery also noted that there were currently thirty four churches in vacancy across the Presbytery. The Presbytery also approved the overture sent down from the General Assembly via the Theological Forum in relation to Confessions of Faith. The Church is being asked to approve that the Westminster Confession of Faith will have a

status similar to that of the Scots Confession and the 1992 Statement of Faith. The two ancient creeds, the Apostles' Creed (which we use at Communion) and the Nicene Creed remain the core of our faith, with the Bible as the supreme guide to what we believe.

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CHRISTMAS TREE FESTIVAL

Despite adverse weather, last year's Tree Festival was much appreciated by our congregation and also by the large number of people who use our building, so we're having it again.

It will run from Saturday 9^{th} until Sunday 17^{th} December, generally from 10 - 2 pm though on Sundays trees can be viewed after the 10.30 service, that is from 11.30 - 1pm.

Most of the participants had a tree last year but this time we are joined by the three churches we are seeking to form closer links with: Fairmilehead, Greenbank and St John's Colinton Mains.

We have the same generous sponsor as last year – William

Purves – and they will also decorate a tree.

Refreshments will be served on the Saturdays from 10 - 12 noon, The Social Committee has kindly agreed to provide coffee/tea and a mince pie with brandy cream for £5. Children will be offered juice and biscuits free. Table decorations at the refreshments will be made by the Rainbows.

It is not primarily a fundraising event, so entry will be by donation though there will be a raffle and a quiz for the kids. Many of you will already know about the Craft Stall run again by Rona McLaren who has been providing knitting patterns for those who might like to knit a tree decoration or a Santa bag. All crafted items are welcome and cash raised will go again to the church's charities: the Pad Project and the Edinburgh Clothing Store. The stall will mainly be on the two Saturdays though – depending on stock and staffing – hopefully also on the two Sundays and at Wednesday coffee.

We hope this will bring festive cheer to our own congregation and also to our neighbours.

WORSHIP NOTES

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper

The next communion service will be on Sunday 3rd December, which is also the first Sunday of Advent. The Common Cup, discontinued during Lockdown, will be reinstated but served in a slightly different format. When the elders take the elements out to serve the congregation, the Minister will take the Common Cup from the Communion Table and carry it to the back of the Church and place it beside a plate of bread which will already be on one of the console tables. If you wish to receive the Common Cup, please leave your seat from wherever you are sitting in Church and make your way to this small table, where the Minister will serve you the bread and wine as you stand around the table. It is a practice we used at the evening services some years ago. Otherwise, please remain in your seats and be served with bread and individual glasses by the elders as usual.

This is an experiment until we see how many request communion in this form. After the December communion, the Minister with the Worship Committee and Kirk Session will review the situation.

For many years the Edinburgh Telephone Choir was on the list of entertainers for the Wednesday (Evening) Club and at the suggestion of the late Rev. George Munro, this became the now well established Carol Concert. The disabled men thoroughly enjoy the singing in the company of relatives, friends and members of the congregation. Their evening continues with refreshments in the company of members of the choir, along with the traditional visit from Santa.

This year's concert/sing-a-long, led by the choir's Musical Director, Jennifer Gosling, is on Wednesday 13th December at 7.30pm in the church. At the grand piano will be the choir's accompanist John Chan and the choir's previous accompanist Marion McPherson, will lead the congregational singing from the organ.

The Wednesday Club was in danger of closing following the withdrawal of transport funded by the Council. As the Club receives no funding and is purely reliant on donations it was deemed that there were insufficient monies in the Club's funds to provide transport. As the journey was made


From a dark corner
