Dear Friends

In 1980 I went on a school trip to the old Soviet Union, ten days in Moscow then Leningrad (now St Petersburg). I was studying the Russian Revolution in my last year at school and it was a chance of a lifetime to visit the sites. On one bitterly cold Spring day we were taken to cemeteries where the war-dead were buried.

The siege began on 8 September 1941, when the German army severed the last road to the city. Although Soviet forces managed to open a narrow land corridor to the city on 18 January 1943, the Red Army did not lift the siege until 27 January 1944, 872 days (125 weeks) after it began. The siege became one of the longest and most destructive sieges in history, and it was possibly the costliest siege in history due to the number of casualties which were suffered throughout its duration. An estimated 1.5 million people died as a result of the siege. Military and civilian casualties. Men, women and children. Most in vast mounded unmarked graves. Solemn music played from hidden loudspeakers amongst the trees. It was one of the most overwhelmingly emotional experiences I have ever had. Those who have visited the war graves in Northern France and Flanders may have had similar experiences. Row up on row of white

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crosses. Some with names, or a regiment, some with the words, 'Known only unto God'.

War is rarely if ever glamorous. Veterans will often speak of long stretches of boredom punctuated by moments of hideous panic. Some will talk of dogged duty. Some will speak of 'doing their bit.' Some will talk, after it is all over, about the waste of it all, and the needless loss of so much human life and the cause of ongoing human suffering.

Historians will rightly ask if war is ever really over, as there is nearly always one or several conflicts simmering in some part of the world at any given moment.

Faith takes a battering during war time, and there is no point in denying that. Nevertheless, for some it is the one, sinuous, fragile thing that they hold on to, hoping against hope, finding somehow the help that is required to persevere.

When the poppy wreaths are placed at our Church war memorials I always take the time to look at the names recorded. I think about them, and the families from which they came, and the future they never had. And, through the faith I have, determine all over again not to waste their sacrifice, but try to shape a world, however imperfectly, in the attitude of peace and love and kindness and respect.

God is a God of peace, and we owe it to God, and to the memories of those who died, to 'do our bit' today – for peace in every part of our lives – in every part of our world.

KIRK SESSION NEWS

The Kirk Session met in October and discussed the following:

Presbytery Reform – The Moderator reported that Greenbank had now identified four elders to meet with the four from Morningside to try to progress discussion. The meetings of the team of four elders from each church should press ahead with discussion without the ministers being involved, to see what common ground existed and what new opportunities might be possible with the joint resources of our two churches.

Outreach – Kimberly Milne, Convenor, reported that the current yearly financial commitment to the selected charities was: to each of The Edinburgh Clothing Store and The David Nott Foundation a guaranteed £1,500. Thereafter any additional funds raised are divided equally among the two external charities and Morningside Parish Church.

The total distribution from fundraising in 2023 was £11,819. Payment was made in 2024 on the completion of the 2023 accounts and, after an accounting adjustment in respect of funds raised in 2022, resulted in the following distributions:

- The Edinburgh Clothing Store £4,690.74;
- The PAD Project £4,690.74; and
- Morningside Parish Church £2,438.22

Once the total raised in 2024 from Teas & Coffees funds and any other fundraising activities has been finalised, a distribution will be made in 2025 in respect of 2024 fundraising.

The breakdown of Fundraising in 2023 was:

- **Dec 2023** - Christmas retiring collections £1,169.46
- **Dec 2023** - Christmas Tree Festival £1,862.79;
- **Teas & Coffees 2023** £6,780.

Property – Moira Clark, Convenor, reported- **The south aisle roof repair** continues to move slowly onward. Our architect proposed a plan for the new roof and in June the property committee met to review the idea, and approved it in principle.

A quick summary of what is being proposed. The roof above the existing corridor will be raised to provide a deeper and wider gutter section between roof lights which will in turn allow a graded gutter along the length of the corridor falling to the existing outlets (including the new ones installed last year). The glass will be removed and replaced with a solid roof to include roof lights (Velux windows) at intervals along it, which will provide nearly as much natural light as at present.

It is hoped that the actual work could be priced, and contractors appointed, to enable work to start in the summer of 2025.

Moira also had circulated a detailed report of the wide range of Fabric work undertaken in 2024 to date. Items over £500 include:

- Replacing faulty heaters in office £873.28;
- EICR inspection £534 (which identified several items needing to be urgently addressed);
- New water boiler for kitchen £1,890;
- New tables £2,855.58 (funded by Jam, Making and Baking stall);
- Water ingress at Manse £582;

- Replacement of leaking radiator in St Matthew Hall £,3075.32;
- Roof safety system annual check £560.94.

Other significant outstanding matters include repairs to the high roof estimated at £10,238 but an alternative quotation is being sought. There are also repairs due to the manse where the ceiling has come down in the study bay window This will be covered by insurance once the emergency repair to roof is carried out.

Stewardship & Finance - Update on Stewardship Campaign – in the absence of Robert Armour Convenor, **Chris McNeil Treasurer reported** that, including Gift Aid, the Campaign had resulted in a £20k uplift in giving. Further donations are hoped for and an update will be given in November. Christian Aid has yet to let us how much had been raised by the donations of foreign coins – it is being dealt with centrally.

Presbytery Elder's Report - Presbytery met on 10 September and once again dealt with necessary administration of the implementation of the Presbytery plan including appointments and demission of Ministers arising from the changes.

- The Moderator has been appointed Interim Moderator at St Catherine's Argyle.
- Two unions were approved: Kirknewton & East Calder with Ratho; and St Michael's Linlithgow with Avonbridge, Craigmalen and Torphichen.
- The Finance report advised that there will be a small windfall to every church in the Presbytery from the re-designation of the North Merchiston Fund. The Fund, which amounted to £175,000, will provide funding on an equal basis among 95 congregations based on the 2023 list of Presbytery Assessments. The funds are to be used for mission purposes to develop work in the parishes and/or to highlight the work of the church in the local communities. It is anticipated that the sum will be received in the first quarter of 2025. The Report in the 2025 Report and Accounts should include reference to the North Merchiston Fund and a note of the mission work undertaken or planned to be progressed. The Fund was created in 2016 following the sale of a former retirement house in relation to the dissolution of North Merchiston. In the terms of the original Basis of Dissolution, the net proceeds were to be divided equally between the Central Fabric Fund and the "National Church Extension Fund for use on projects within the bounds of the Presbytery of Edinburgh". The difficulty is there are no such projects currently underway within the Presbytery and unsurprisingly OSCR are placing importance on charities utilising funds in line with the charities' objectives.
- Treasurer's seminar - Presbytery held a seminar to alert treasurers to the issues arising from the union of churches and the proper melding of their financial arrangements and registration with OSCR. Chris McNeil attended and found it interesting and potentially challenging but with the speed of discussion on the future of MPC who knows when he will be called upon to use this knowledge!

HARVEST COLLECTION – THANK YOU!



This year's Harvest collection for the Edinburgh SE Foodbank resulted in the largest amount ever being donated – over 316kg. This equates to food parcels being issued to 38 single people - or 17 families with two or three children - with sufficient food to feed them for three days. It was an unbelievable response, for which the Foodbank at Southhouse was hugely grateful, particularly as stock levels have been diminishing since the cost of living crisis, and the pressure on household budgets, has taken hold. Since 2021, the Harvest appeal for donations to the Foodbank has resulted in over 1 (metric) tonne of food being collected by the Church.

Thank you to everyone who contributed food, toiletries and plastic bags, as well as those who made financial donations, which exceeded £220. The money will be used to replenish items where stocks are running particularly low. A huge thank you also to all those “behind the scenes” who assisted in setting up the Church and hall, and collected and delivered all the donations on the Sunday and Monday.



Although Harvest represents our main focal point for supporting the Foodbank, donations can be made throughout the year. There is a clearly labelled large plastic box beneath the pigeonholes in the Braid corridor, into which non-perishable foodstuffs can be placed (tins of soup, meat etc, jars of coffee, biscuits, sweets etc) and toiletries. MORNINGSIDE HOPE CONCERTS – SANTIAGO

Our mid September concert was a new musical venture with a mini local Pilgrimage attached reflecting a musical inspiration by the Santiago Pilgrimage. Our pilgrimage was limited in length (Greenbank Church to Morningside Parish) but effective in communicating the essence of the composition which was receiving its first Scottish performance. We were fortunate in having reflective and appropriate words from Ian Gilmour and Derek Browning in both churches with some musical additions. We attracted a good number from each congregation.

The Santiago composition was written for the interesting duo of electric guitar (Iain Carleton) and organ (Caroline Cradock) and was well received by our large audience. An added bonus was the presence of



the composer, Andrew Campling, who introduced the work he had written in three movements. The opening Andante reflected measured walking, followed by a slow paced Largo with an evocative guitar solo and concluding with a lively Allegro.

The Santiago soloists were joined by the flautist, Roxanne Benezra and trumpeter Ruari Wilson who had masterminded the whole concert and wore his trademark golden suit! Two beautiful pieces for flute and organ included variations on the well known Veni Creator Spiritus and an expressive Picardy piece again suggestive of meandering and walking. Ruari introduced a short three movement piece called Celebration, a gloriously lively celebration with some popular London tunes including London Bridge and Oranges and Lemons incorporated.



We had a first performance of a specially commissioned work for all four soloists, introduced by Andrew, variations on Ein Feste Burg, ending with a reflective fugue. The concert concluded with some audience

participation in two popular numbers, These Boots are Made for Walking and Walk on By, with two sides of the church singing in competition!

This concert was greatly enjoyed and the different aspects, not least the Pilgrimage and joining of two congregations, was an added bonus. A huge thank you to the ministers and the inspiring

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musicians who made this unique event possible. We are greatly appreciative of all our helpers, at the door and providing post-concert refreshments which again proved to be very successful and popular. A special mention is due to Douglas Paterson who has delighted us with his photographic record of every concert.

Our next concert, the last of the series, is very special, representing a culmination of three years of our popular concert series, now an integral part of Morningside Hope which Jacqui Lindsay runs so effectively. We have been fortunate in receiving financial backing and support from the Tor Foundation as well as from Morningside Parish, and our 30 November event will include a Heart for Art Exhibition and will be led by our Music Therapists, Forget Me Notes. We very much hope you will be there, and we continue to be so grateful to our audience members. A new concert series for 2025 is already being planned and promises to be rewarding.

WARS, RUMOURS OF WARS AND NATURAL DISASTERS

With the television news and the press full of reports of wars, rumours of wars and natural disasters it is difficult to watch or read without feeling sympathy, but also powerless to do anything to alleviate the suffering of those affected.

However, in a small way the choice, promoted by our Outreach Committee and approved by the Kirk Session, of the **David Nott Foundation** as one of the three charities we support, was specifically made to do something practical to help people of all ages directly affected by wars or natural disasters are. But who is David Nott and how does his Foundation help those affected?

The David Nott Foundation delivers Trauma Medical Training for doctors serving in areas affected by natural disasters or wars thereby enabling more lives to be saved.

David Nott is a General and Vascular surgeon working for the NHS in major London hospitals. For more than 25 years he took periods of unpaid leave to volunteer in some of the world's most dangerous war zones including Sarajevo under siege in 1993, to spells in Afghanistan and in clandestine hospitals in Aleppo. At various times he worked for the British Red Cross and Médecins Sans Frontières. However, his experiences led him to observe that, while it was useful for him to bring his skills to these areas, his time in these locations was limited and more could be achieved for the wounded survivors if he spent time training local doctors who were perfectly competent in peacetime but lacked the necessary specialised skills to deal with critical and ongoing injuries arising from wars or natural disasters.

The Foundation uses a diverse mix of teaching methods and materials led by a world class faculty of experienced and distinguished surgeons, including using the internet and bringing doctors to the UK for brief training experience. Their vision is a global network of medical professionals providing the best care to patients in austere or hostile environments.

As an example of their pragmatic approach and use of the internet in response to the situation in Palestine with the growth in numbers of trauma injuries due to shelling, shrapnel or collapsed buildings, they have delivered emergency courses to over 70 surgeons and anaesthetists tailored for doctors preparing to travel to Gaza; they have upskilled a further 36 surgeons and 12 Kuwaiti anaesthetists intending to volunteer their skills in Palestine; and recognising the difficulty of supporting the hard pressed and hard to reach medical professionals already on the ground, they have turned their world class surgical training course into a series of short videos which can be watched in their own time.

Support of this charity will mean that we don't just sympathise with the plight of those injured by wars and natural disasters, but in a small way we can do something to help alleviate the problem.

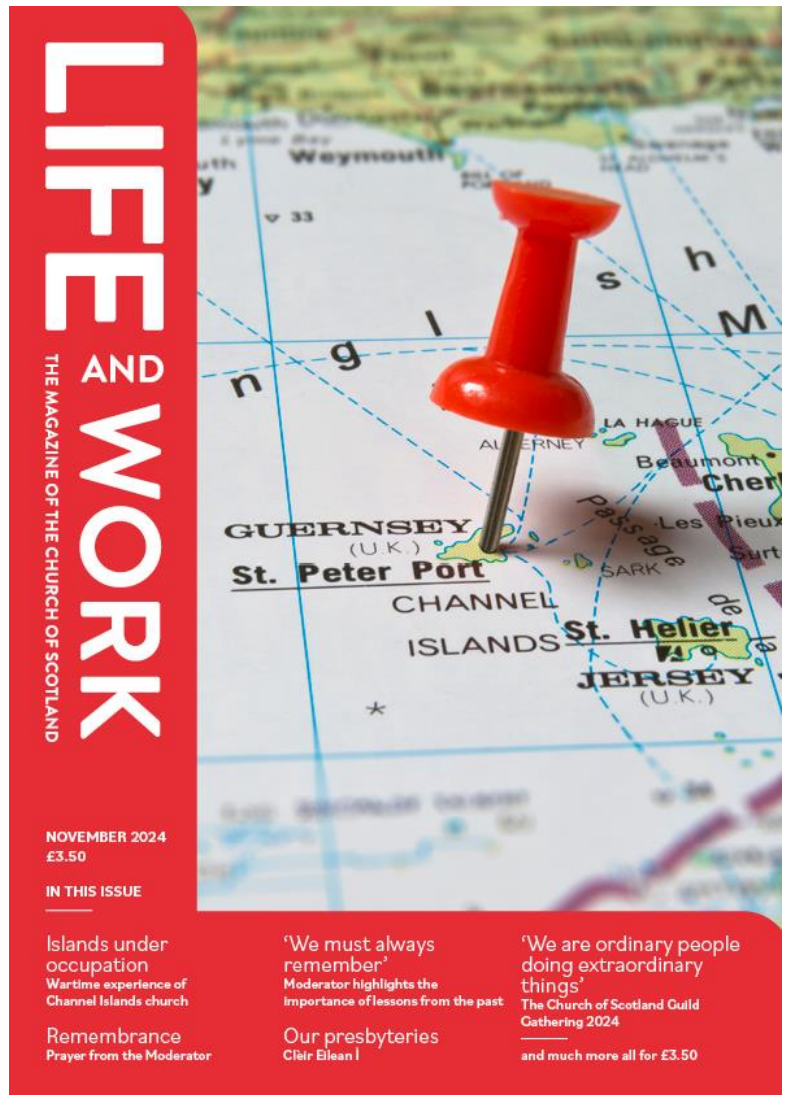
