

Dear Friends

I was struck by this quote from Winston Churchill which I heard during the VE Day commemorations in May: "Success is not final; failure is not fatal. It is the courage to continue that counts." It applied to Britain in the depths of World War II. But it applied to other wars too. On 15th August there will be a commemoration of VJ Day, often overlooked, but one which has left an

atomic bomb-shaped mark on the history of our world. Far from our shores in the UK, but men and women served, fought and died in the Far East, and they and their families still bear the marks of that conflict. As do others who served in the Korean War, and Aden, and Cyprus, and Palestine, and North Africa, and the Falklands, and Afghanistan, and Iraq. And let us not forget Northern Ireland, the Civil War within our own borders.

To say nothing of all the other casualties to peace that stain and scar our world today in so many different countries. One of the tragedies of humanity, and there are many, is to be found in the old Roman saying, 'Those who wish for peace must prepare for war." *Success is not final; failure is not fatal. It is the courage to continue that counts'*, applies not only to matters of war and peace, but to the struggles and fears and hopes and dreams of life. Where do we need the courage to continue, knowing full well that nothing stays the same forever? All those times when we have thought we have got everything in the right place, and sorted out, then out of nowhere destiny throws a curve ball, or tosses a spanner into the works. The unexpected health condition; the redundancy; the relationship melt-down; the financial blow; the bereavement.



In our world and country today, and in our Church today, I feel there is a call for us to be courageous, and to continue, which is going to count.

The toughness to stand together, work together, share together, serve together in the current climate is what we will need for all the days ahead. It's not something confined to the past. It's something that is still needed today.

Ernest Hemingway wrote that, "Courage is grace under pressure." I wonder, for all of us, where will we need to be courageous, and where, under pressure, will grace be displayed?

KIRK SESSION NEWS

The Kirk Session met in May and discussed the following:

Reports – Communications Committee – Isobel Paterson, Convenor, reported that the group regularly considers if there is any way we might improve communication both within our congregation and with the wider community, but have so far this year consolidated rather than innovated.

Website - Efforts to transfer the management of the website to Worx24 are progressing slowly. The viewer will see no change, but it simplifies maintenance issues.

Social Media - Facebook continues to be used. The church has its own page but posting on the Facebook 'I Love Morningside' site has proved useful in reaching a wider audience.

Jam, Baking and Making Stall - This continues to be a useful fundraiser for the church and also encourages participation from a wide group. New bakers would be most welcome. In 11 stalls in 2024 the stall raised £2,624.50.

Christmas cards - This is a worthwhile task that benefits from the meticulous work of the Roll Keeper, Alison Calder and the Church Administrator.

Christmas Tree Festival - will take place on 13 - 20th December (10-12 weekdays; 10-2 on Saturdays).

- Thursday 11th afternoon & evening will be setting up time.
- Dismantling will be after the morning service on 21st.
- Sponsor: William Purves, local undertaker, has generously agreed to sponsor us again.
- Participants: It was agreed that the Moderator would ask Canaan Lane School if they wanted to decorate a tree. Otherwise, we will approach those who have happily participated in the past.
- Musical events: It is hoped that last year's performers will participate again.
- Refreshments: Fiona Stimpson has agreed to provide refreshments which will be in the Braid Hall. It is hoped to have a Christmas tree trail that might end at the entrance to refreshments to encourage customers.
- Invitations will be sent to nursing homes and nurseries. Posters will be emailed to Care Homes and nurseries in the area to see if they would like to come on weekday mornings when visitors are few.
- Craft Stall: Rona McLaren is happy to take charge of this again.
- Beneficiaries: The Committee decided that Morningside Hope should get half of any money raised and that the other half would go to an overseas charity.

Nomination of new elders - The Moderator reported that four of the suggested people had agreed to become elders - Robert McCabe; Morag Shankland; Laura Shaw; and Neil Thrower. He proposed to meet with the prospective elders to discuss further the role of an elder and then hold another meeting towards the end of August/beginning of September with them and some of the Session. The date for ordination will be about the end of September/early October. Session was happy to approve the proposals.

Annual appointment of Representative Presbytery Elder - The Moderator advised that the Clerk was willing to serve for another year as Representative Presbytery Elder and Session approved his appointment.

WORSHIP NOTES

Sunday 1st June will be when we next celebrate the **Sacrament of the Lord's Supper**. Services will be held at 9.30am and 10.30am in the Church as usual. All are welcome to share in these communion services. That Sunday is also Ascension Sunday when we mark the time of Jesus' departure from earth, after Easter and resurrection, and before Pentecost.

Sunday 8th June is **Pentecost** and the birth of the Christian Church. The colour red is often associated with the Holy Spirit Who came to bless the followers of Jesus in Jerusalem. If you're so minded, wear something red to Church on Pentecost Sunday!

The last 9.30am service for the Summer will be on Sunday 8th June. The 9.30am services recommence on Sunday 7th September.

Choral Evensong, Sunday 15th June, 7.30pm

Our organist and choir will give a service of choral evensong on 15th June, a service that is popular with many. Entry will be by donation and all proceeds raised will go towards funding the choral scholarships for the next session.

STATED MEETING

The Stated Meeting of the congregation will be on Sunday 22nd June at 11.45 am in the Church (after the morning service). This is an opportunity to hear from the Session Clerk and Treasurer about the life and finances of the Church. Papers will be available in the Church vestibule two weeks before the meeting.


Sunday, 24th August 2025 at 12 noon

More details will follow nearer the time via the intimations.




The talk will last approximately 50 minutes and then there will be a chance to chat with the speaker and each other over tea and coffee.

From a recent issue of *Console*, the newsletter of the Edinburgh Society of Organists:

ORGAN FAVOURITES – REVIEW BY JOHN KITCHEN

Long-time ESO member and well-known Edinburgh musician Morley Whitehead has recently recorded a very fine CD on the organ at which he has now officiated for 33 years: that of Morningside Parish Church. This organ has not been much recorded, although we did include it in Organs of Edinburgh. A new recording is therefore very welcome, particularly one as well recorded and produced as this.

Morley's programme does indeed include many favourites: Bach's Jesu, joy and Air from the Suite in D; Stanley's Trumpet Tune; Thalben-Ball's Elegy, and ending with the Prière à Notre Dame and the Toccata from the Suite Gothique of Boëllmann. But there are lesser-known pieces too: Theme with Variations in A minor by William Faulkes (does one pronounce the L?) and the Variations on 'In Dulci Jubilo' by the tuneful Denis Bédard. (Variations always give a player plenty of scope to show off different registrations.) Two of Kenneth Leighton's Fantasies on Hymns Tunes are included: 'Lumetto' and 'St Columba'. Morley is a keen advocate of Kenneth's music, and so it is fitting to have these fine pieces included; they were of course commissioned by the late great Herrick Bunney whose assistant Morley was in St Giles' from 1971 - 1991. So a well-chosen selection of repertoire for all tastes. (Keen-eared listeners will notice how effectively Morley juxtaposes the different pieces, often relating their keys to avoid unwelcome gear-changes from one item to the next.)

The liner notes helpfully and fascinatingly set out, side by side, the changes that have taken place in this organ over the decades: built by Father Willis in 1901 (his last organ in Scotland); rebuilt 1929 by Rushworth & Dreaper; rebuilt again 1980 by R&D, introducing some then-fashionable neoclassical influences; and finally in 2004 by Harrison & Harrison who wisely reversed some of these changes. This is all carefully documented in the notes. Morley knows the organ better than anyone and puts it through its paces with great skill, displaying a wide variety of colours. The 2004 vox humana makes several welcome appearances, as does the new tromba, notably in the Stanley Trumpet Tune, where Morley wisely 'meets the organ on its own terms' and does not try to make it sound like an 18th-century instrument. And lots of lovely celestes to enjoy—there are sets on both swell and choir. (I recently learned than in another Edinburgh church a lady calls the celestes "the shimmers", a rather apt description!) Of course, we also hear the full organ several times, and very impressive it is.

The CD has been expertly recorded by Matt Norriss, and the presentation of the booklet and accompanying photography (much of it also by Matt) is beautiful, with a lovely cover picture of the noble edifice of MPC with a large cherry tree in the foreground. My only criticism of this cover is that Morley's name isn't prominent enough!
