Dear Friends

None of us has lived through a time like this before. The situation facing our community, country and world is bringing out the very best, and sometimes the very worst, in people. It is hard to imagine what the next weeks will bring, and it has been interesting even at this early stage to see what people are missing. So much of our faith life in the Church is based around being in community with each other. The sense of dislocation not being able to gather for worship, or for coffee, or meet with the different organisations and groups, has been overwhelming.

What we are as a Church is more than simply the building, magnificent though that building is. What we are as a Church is the people of God, wherever we may be found. Helping, sharing, listening, caring, laughing, crying, believing, and acting.

How we will be judged when this surreal time ends will be by how we showed our compassion for one another, our forbearance for one another, and our love for one another. We miss our Church, what it does, and we miss its people. But weaving through our loss and bewilderment, God still moves. As I type this, I've been in conversations today with community leaders and neighbours and one of our older members. Everyone has been determined to see their way through this time, and to offer what is both practical and sustainable as far as they are able. Not one is

able to solve the whole challenge, but everyone acting together in their own way, even as a distanced community, will see efforts join up, and help given, and hope offered.

In the midst of this awkward, empty, frightening time Easter falls. In a different age, but equally unsettling, dislocating and bewildering for the friends and followers of Jesus. Having been with Him for years, suddenly He was no longer there. Dead and gone, some said. Just gone, said others.

It is true, He was not there, for He had risen.

Amidst what we miss at this time, and what feels gone, the perplexing presence of Jesus remains. Sometimes just beyond our seeing, sometimes iust beyond our hearing, but we can feel it. With that promise, that Jesus will come again. Through these days, know that though life may be different in

future, life will come again, and life in all its fullness. That is the promise of Easter; that is the promise of faith.

I am so grateful to the large number of people who are working hard to serve and support our congregation and parish at this time. So many public and private acts of kindness and faithfulness. It has been truly wonderful. Hold on, be kind, find new resilience, ask for help, give help. The Lord is risen! He is risen indeed!

at Easter

KIRK SESSION NEWS

The Kirk Session met in March. Amongst its business:

PVG (Protecting Vulnerable Groups) - Paul Cackette, Convenor, reported PVG clearance had come through for Robert Armour and Session approved his assisting with work with vulnerable adults in the Wednesday Club. Paul also laid before Session the Safeguarding Congregational Register of members involved in voluntary work with children and vulnerable adults and the roll was duly attested. He drew attention to the fact that there were still a number of volunteers who had not undertaken training. Training opportunities had been provided at MPC in the past and there were regular opportunities to complete training at sessions organised by the Presbytery.

Stewardship & Finance – Chris McNeil, Treasurer welcomed Anne Dobson to speak to the details but reported that the content of the accounts was different this year because, in terms of OSCR's regulations, our Church was treated as a large charity which in turn made it subject to the more exhaustive scrutiny of an audit.

It was treated as a large charity because the apparent size of its income is £922,378. This exceptionally high level of income was primarily the result of the fact that the sale proceeds of the flat at 26 Esslemont Road amounting to £527,146 were, following advice from 121, properly lodged with the Consolidated Fabric Fund of the General Trustees to be held solely for the benefit of fabric matters at MPC. The release of the funds of £527,146 by the General Trustees was duly made towards payment of the costs for the recent works to the sanctuary, namely the removal of the pews, the replacement of the lighting and the overdue upgrading of the electrical switch gear. This cash transfer was, in terms of the accounting rules, added to our income under "other income".

Conversely, because the money was spent on improving the church, including other fabric work, it was included in the expenditure under the heading of "donation to the Church of Scotland" as the title to the church is vested in the General Trustees.

The entries balance themselves out but the consequence is that it put the accounts into a different treatment of accounting which, together with the way OSCR requires the accounts to be set out, does not help an easy understanding of the church's finances.

The accounts state that "With income of £922,378 and Expenditure of £1,011,222 in 2019 there was an operating deficit of £88,844 for the year to end December 2019." However this deficit includes "one off fabric costs of £33,093 so the running deficit amounted to £55,751." This compares with the projected budget deficit of £90,000 so there has been significant progress in addressing the deficit position – although clearly further improvement is needed..

Session approved the accounts and authorised the Treasurer and Session Clerk to sign the accounts on behalf of the Session.

The detailed work in preparing the accounts and answering the auditor's questions had fallen on a number of people but in particular acknowledgement was made of, and thanks given for, the work of the Treasurer and Greenbank Accountants.

Pastoral Assistant – The Moderator reported that Jacqui Lindsay had seen her medical Consultant today and was planning to continue her phased return. The project for people with a diagnosis of dementia, Music and Memories in Morningside, had been well received.

Fair Trade - Marie Ogilvie reminded Session that we are a Fair Trade church and all organisations should be using Fair trade products. It was the anniversary of our original commitment and Session was asked and agreed to re-commit to being a Fair Trade Church.

The April Kirk Session meeting has been cancelled.

WORSHIP MATTERS


Sunday services:

Read one of the Easter stories in one of the gospels, say prayers of thanksgiving for the hope of our faith, listen to one of the services on the radio or television, play some uplifting Easter music if you have it; and if the weather is warmer and sunny, enjoy a walk in the open air and give thanks for God's newness coming upon the earth. The Easter Sunday service will be recorded in our Church and put on to our website on Easter Monday.

Remembering Service 19th April has been cancelled

Afternoon service, 7th May, 3.15pm

We are waiting to see if worship restrictions have been lifted by May. At the moment it is not looking likely, so it is probable that this service will be cancelled.

Church Flowers

Church flowers will not be distributed on Sundays for the time being.

General Assembly 2020

The Assembly for this year has been cancelled. Please remember Colin Sinclair, the current Moderator, and Martin Fair, the Moderator Designate, at this frustrating and disappointing time. Thought is being give about how to install Martin as Moderator for 2020-2021.

Pastoral Care at Morningside Parish Church during the Coronavirus situation

The Minister and Pastoral Assistant have met to discuss what will be possible pastorally over the next few weeks. Please let us know if there are any people who you think might

appreciate a phone call or email at this time. We've drawn up a list, but there is plenty of scope to contact others. And if you would like a call – do not hesitate to contact us!

Pastoral visitors have been contacted by Jacqui Lindsay and asked to keep in touch with their 'charges' by telephone.

Funerals in Church will not be possible, but the Minister will still be conducting funerals at the crematorium or by a graveside. Anyone who has a bereavement should contact the Minister and an undertaker, and then the arrangements will be made. There may be restrictions on numbers attending funeral services, so it may be that a simple service will be held, with the offer of a memorial service later on.

Practical Help

We have considered how to offer appropriate practical support where possible to those who have self-isolated and who have no extended family or others able to provide basic help. Consequently, if you are willing to help with collecting basic shopping, pick up and deliver prescriptions, or post letters, please contact Jacqui Lindsay who will collate names, and then, if we receive requests and are able to help, will make the necessary connections. We will keep this matter under review and continue to assess its sustainability. Only consider volunteering if you are not in the 'vulnerable' category yourself, and are fully fit and well!

We are also keeping an eye on support for the South East Edinburgh Foodbank. It may be that opportunities to donate and deliver supplies will be necessary as the period of social isolation continues and people face increasing hardship.

The Minister is regularly involved with a wide group of community leaders, politicians, charities and volunteer groups and if needs arise, information will be posted on the church website and Facebook page.

Please remember, throughout the Coronavirus situation, regularly wash your hands with soap and hot water for 20 seconds. If you feel unwell, or develop any symptoms, stay at home for seven days. If you are isolated and need help with basic shopping, prescription collection, letter posting or dog-walking, let us know. If we can help, we will.

Finally, please remember to pray for all affected at this time - those with the virus and their families, and the health, social and emergency services providing care and attention. It is a difficult and surreal time for all of us, but we will get through it, and look forward to returning to normality as soon as we can.

MORNINGSIDE PARISH CHURCH FINANCIAL UPDATE

The 2019 Annual Accounts for Morningside Parish Church were presented to the Kirk Session on 10th March 2020 and were duly approved.

Highlights of income received included a one-off transfer of £527,146 by the Church of Scotland General Trustees from the Church of Scotland Consolidated Fabric Fund, being the net proceeds from the sale of a former Braid Church Minister's house in Esslemont Road. These funds were used exclusively for the alterations in the Sanctuary, including the removal of pews, new flooring and the installation of a new, highly efficient, underfloor heating system.

Apart from this exceptional item, we received income from four main regular sources, namely congregational offerings, hall rental income, investment income and VAT reclaimed on fabric works through the Listed Places of Worship Grant Scheme.

In addition, sundry income was received from donations from organisations using the Church Hall premises such as the Baby and Toddler Group and the various uniformed organisations, as well as the very generous donation of £5,000 from the Friends of Morningside Parish Church to fund five choral scholarships for 2019-20.

On the expenditure side, our fixed costs included our annual Ministries and Mission allocation of £124,514 for 2019, staff salaries amounting to £90,718 (Pastoral Assistant, Church Administrator, two Caretakers, Church Officer and Organist), fabric repairs and maintenance totalling £41,624 and heating and lighting costs of £18,039.

The financial outcome for the year was an operating deficit of £88,864 which included some one-off costs totalling £33,093 such as the installation of a new heating and lighting control system following all the recent alterations, and remedial work on the Church roof.

Excluding these one-off costs, the running deficit for the year ended December 2019 was £55.751.

Apart from the current running deficit, the Church now faces additional unprecedented financial challenges from the coronavirus shutdown, as some major sources of income dry up, including Sunday offerings from the Open Plate, gift-aided donations, and a total loss of all rental income for the foreseeable future.

Financial Giving to the Church during the Coronavirus situation

Like Churches and organisations across the country, we face extremely challenging times ahead-but you can help to ensure that together we will survive this crisis financially.

With all the new restrictions on travel, social gatherings, concerts, theatres, cinemas, restaurants, bars and coffee shops you may well find that your social life spending will have already gone down dramatically, so please consider making extra donations to the Church in addition to your regular giving. This will help the Church get through the coronavirus crisis, meet our financial obligations and protect our staff.

If you are able, increased donations would be very helpful. If you have a direct debit or standing order set up, please make the necessary arrangements through your bank. You will also notice that a new 'donate' button has been added to our website, for both one-off and regular payments. (It would be very helpful if you would let our Free Will Offering and Gift Aid Convenor Euan Murray know if you have made a transfer so that gift aid can be claimed if applicable - please email: euanmurray@me.com)

Please **DO NOT** send cheques or cash to the Church for the time being as we will be unable to process that while the Church premises remain closed.

There will be a significant impact on Church finances over these weeks so your continuing, or increased, generosity will be particularly important. Your generosity enables so much to happen in and around our Church. It's important to support the Church as much as we can; our offerings support not only our congregation but other church work across the country and the world. However, we recognise that not everybody will be able to respond at what will be a challenging and uncertain financial time for many. We're grateful for all donations received.

BETHANY CARE SHELTER



The Bethany Care Shelter is now in its permanent location of a building called "Diadem" formerly Stenhouse St Aidan's Parish Church at the corner of Chesser Avenue and Gorgie Road which is now part of Gorgie Dalry Stenhouse Parish Church. The building is now a community centre and the sanctuary has been converted for the use of the Bethany Care Shelter, providing a hot meal, advice, overnight accommodation and breakfast for homeless people sleeping rough in Edinburgh. Thanks to a kind donation there are now proper beds (as opposed to mats on the floor) for up to 70 people and brand new showers and washing facilities have been installed.

The Care Shelter runs every night including Christmas for 32 weeks from late September to middle of May. The Church teams provide a minibus driver if possible and the minibus sets off with a member of staff to collect people at the end of the Western Approach Road at 9pm and 9.30pm. Some make their own way to the venue. There is a later collection at 11pm for accommodation only. There are about 70 catering teams on a rota basis who are volunteers from churches in Edinburgh and around.

Our Church team provided a 2 course hot meal at 9.30pm for 45 plus 4 staff on the first night, 30th January, and 63 plus staff on the second night, 5th March. Lots of tea, coffee and juice is drunk. Supplies are left for breakfast in the morning. The minibus does one run back into town at that time.

The staff who stay all night and give advice etc are all employed by Bethany. Bethany works closely with several other agencies to help those reduced to sleeping rough with physical and mental health issues and help and advice for moving on to more permanent accommodation. These include two housing officers seconded from Edinburgh Council, visits from a GP from the Access Practice at the top of Leith Walk, visits from a community psychiatric nurse, a visiting chiropodist and daytime support from Crisis, the national homelessness charity.

Thank you to those who supported the coffee morning or gave donations and to all the members of the catering team.




